

WEST MELBOURNE PARKS AND RECREATION MASTER PLAN TIMELINE









Key Takeaways: Parks

- Community Park is the most popular park
- Some parks appear to be private/HOA owned which deters public use i.e., Westbrook Park, Hammock Lakes Park, and Jan Lieson Park
- Parks should incorporate the following:
 - Shade
 - Walking loops/fitness trail
 - Improved lighting (security)
- Park branding could be improved i.e. consistent naming and visual cues

Key Takeaways: Recreation

- Many residents are unaware of programming provided by the City
- Provide more facilities and programs for seniors
- Provide more youth programs
- Improve indoor space for recreational programming



Walkability and Connectivity

Parks are accessible, walkable, and well connected:

- Each resident lives within a
 10 or 15-minute walk of a park
- Each park is connected to a sidewalk or trail network
- Each park promotes safe walking, jogging, or bicycling for all


